HOW WILL YOU STAY IN TOUCH DURING THE NEXT WILDFIRE? Emergency Communication in the Age of Twitter

Starting with the Upper Deerhorn Fire on July 19, we followed (with stomachs clenched) the Monte Vista, Cowboy, Honey Springs and Border wildfires. As a firesurviving community, we all have a heightened awareness of what those smoke plumes can mean. Radio and television aren't reliable sources for early notification to the backcountry. We need good information and we need it EARLY; this comes down to depending upon ourselves to locate as many information resources as possible- and share them.

ENTER SOCIAL MEDIA: With suggestions and encouragement from Capt. Nick Schuler and Chief John Kremensky of CalFire/RuralFD, Deerhorn Valley is taking its first steps into the world of social media by setting up Twitter, Blogspot, and Facebook websites. These have a different purpose than does DeerhornValley.net. They are fast, easy to upload with a cell phone, and (MOST IMPORTANT) people can share information back and forth, even if the

YELLOW JACKETS... -by Rob Deason



YELLOW JACKETS! Often called "meat bees" from their notorious invasion of your BBQ, are actually wasps, and yes, they eat meat . . . cheese too. If you are outdoors and see one or two around, often pestering your dog at mealtime, there are *hundreds* nearby and it's time to trap. They'll barge in, scout your plate, find a tender corner on your steak or burger, nibble off a BB-sized chunk and take off with it... They'll be back to join the ten that gathered while you watched, and – A WARNING – the one that sneaked down into your sugary soda and is waiting with a surprise!

GOOD NEWS... Dealing with yellow jackets is easy! The week before your BBQ, hang out wasp traps . . . Believe me, they work! In three to five days of diligent trapping the invaders will be on high only watching your party!

THE TRAP... Wasp traps are typically transparent, yellow, and (when baited) attract yellow jackets inside. After nibbling a chunk of the bait, they climb up the inside of a tall cone that diminishes to their body size. When they "exit" to go home, they find themselves imprisoned to their demise.

WARNING... Traps come with a little plastic ampoule of chemical "attractant." Don't use it! Yes it works, but evaporates overnight, and it is so vile and pungent that a drop touching your finger or kitchen counter will stink all day, and if you don't wash your hands surgically, when you go to bed you'll remain awake... and alone.

SOFT DOG FOOD! Buy a can of Costco's Kirkland Lamb & Rice or Pedigree's from Albertsons— anything with a 'meaty' flavor, the softer and juicier, the better. I've tried a chunk of meat, but it spoils too quickly and the yellow jackets don't like it. There's no spoiled food at a BBQ. Dog food lasts about three days. All you need is a teaspoonful placed loosely in the round bait holder inside, then use the back of the spoon to smear some around the inside of the outer container near vent holes. Hang the trap in the open wind, higher than your dog can jump, and wait one hour. Yellow jackets respond quickly, and if you don't have at least ten inside, the wind isn't in your favor or the trap should be moved. One time I had a trap half full in two hours – at least 300. **RE-BAIT...** Each wasp takes a little food before it enters the noway-out room, so the trap needs to be re-baited every other day, or whenever there are no more live critters inside - which could also indicate that you got them all! I empty ours early in the morning when the trapped ones are dead, and before the

Hint: Buy two traps and set them fifty feet apart. You may find one works well, the other, gimpily. Move them to where they

morning rush. I pour them down a gopher hole - if I can find one



work and keep it up until the critters are gone. Expect a couple of half-full catches for two days, then diminishing for a few days, indicating you probably did them in. Happy trapping.



RODENT WRANGLING

When we moved to our Deerhorn home almost thirty years ago, **Jim & Betty Love** left us the tools they thought would be helpful for a couple of city-folk: tractor,

weed whacker, chainsaw... and gopher traps. I took one look at those traps, labeled them as inhumane-- and tossed them, You all know the ending to this story: after three fig trees fell over, and

my first garden disappeared –plant by plant– off I headed to **Simpson's** for more traps. I had SO much to learn.

GOPHERS and I have battled for 27 years now. I pride myself that they are fairly well under control, and I've become a pretty good trapper (I call it "feeding the hawks.")



BUT THEN CAME THE SQUIRRELS...

Not the cute tree squirrels of family camping memories. GRRRRR...OUND squirrels: carriers of plague, chewers of sprinkler heads and irrigation lines, burrowers and underminers of oaks, woodpiles, fences, foundations and roadways. And they have arrived by the dozens and dozens.

IT WAS TIME FOR ME TO PLAY

PREDATOR... Coyotes and hawks have started to return post-fire, but they cannot keep up with our resident rodents. The squirrel population has reproduced without shame since emerging to a fire-scarred land without predators. It was definitely my time to step forward and take on that role... and restore a little balance to Elena Lane.

At first (please don't laugh), I caught them one-at-a-time in a Hav-A-Hart trap and relocated them. Not only is this illegal-- but I'm sure I saw the same little squirrel faces laughing at me the next day. (A previous Antler article told of **Emily Bennett** spraypainting them yellow just to prove to Floyd that his squirrel-relocation plan wasn't working!)

Last summer **Jim Norton** lent me his pellet gun. Between the trapping and shooting, I "dispatched" 47 squirrels.

Seemed like a lot of squirrels, but it didn't even make a dent. Then a Mother Grundy friend sent a photo of 16 (SIXTEEN!) squirrels caught in her Squirrel-N-Ator. You bet I went right down to **Jamul Hardware** and got mine... complete with "dunking tray." I've now dispatched about 80... and I *think* I might be noticing fewer of them cavorting about the property. Maybe.

BEST PRACTICES: It turns out that there are some actual "best practices" for dealing with ground squirrels. The three main methods are effective at different times in the year, so pay attention:

FUMIGATION... Start EARLY!


January and February are the breeding months, and fumigating the burrows with a gas bomb is most effective then. The

fumigators look like small sticks of dynamite and go by names like Giant Destroyer. Squirrels have extensive tunnels, so cover as many entrances as possible, and use two sticks. (Old timers tell me they accomplish the same thing with car exhaust, but I can't vouch for either effectiveness or legality.)

POISON BAIT... We've never poisoned, being too tearful of harming our dogs or other critters that might pick up a carcass. But there are "safer" ways to do it, and special baits pose less danger to pets and wildlife. DO NOT USE anything with brodifacoum, bromadiolone or

ditethialone (like D-Con). These can kill in a single feeding, and the poison remains in the carcass posing a danger to secondary feeders: nawks, vultures, coyotes, dogs, cats, etc. D-Con and related poisons are designed for indoor areas and are illegal (and dangerous) to use in open spaces.

The San Diego Dept. of Agriculture, Weights and Measures provides rodent bait for rats, squirrels and mice with diphacinone (anticoagulant) **at cost**. It is available at the Main Office in Kearny Mesa (5555 Overland Ave, Suite 3101 858-694-2739.) Use a bait station to protect other animals. The squirrels must feed on the grain over a period of a week or more. But you still need to keep pets away, check the areas frequently, and remove and dispose of any carcasses (use gloves).



squirrel controls. Traps are most effective when the squirrels have turned to feeding on seed, starting as soon as our grasses begin to dry– around March.

TRAPPING is certainly the safest, and most satisfying control. The Squirrel-N-Ator Live Trap really works. I place it near an active area, bait it

with birdseed, and place some small logs and brush on top. The squirrels push their way in through a one-way door to feed. I've trapped 5-6 at a time regularly. One of the cashiers at Jamul Hardware swears her grandmother caught 30 at one time.

I can only dream. It comes with a plastic "dunking tray" (enough said) for around \$60. Put them out for the hawks.

"GRISLY" DISCOVERY ON MOTHER GRUNDY TRUCK TRAIL...

PEPSIS WASPS: This formal name and the more common "tarantula hawk" give clues to the insect and its survival. This artistically colored creature here is shown pollinating a tall plant in the milkweed family along Mother Grundy Truck Trail. (Can any of you identify the bush for us?) The tarantula serves as host for the pepsis wasp babies. First the insect stings the spider. The paralyzed spider becomes the nutrition for the wasplings and stays alive until they are ready to munch it down. What parents won't do for their offspring!

WARNING: For all their beauty and docile nature, the sting of the

Pepsis is the most painful of all winged insect stings; the pain only lasts for a few minutes— but is pure agony. It has been described as "Immediate, blinding, fierce, and shockingly electric pain that simply shuts down one's ability to do anything, except, perhaps, scream."

AUTUMN ... Through the Years

SEPTEMBER 4, 1974 – The Deerhorn Valley Volunteer Fire Department (**DVVFD**) forms and receives their original emergency equipment: a Coast Triple Action Pumper. The DVVFD will be housed in the **Payne** Family's barn.

1975 – The Ladies' Auxiliary forms to support our Volunteers

1997 – DVVFD moves to the **Bennett's** on Deerhorn Valley Rd.

1979 – DVVFD moves to the **Jacob's** on Honey Springs Rd.

1984 – DV community fundraising buys a '75 Ford Attack pumper.

1987– The search for land for a *real* fire station ends when the **Jacob Family** gifts a parcel on **Honey Springs**.
Fundraising for a permanent Fire Station-Community Center begins.

SEPTEMBER 1993 - Paul and Dianne

Jacob cut the cake at the dedication of the new fire station (photo on right).

SEPTEMBER 2003 – Deerhorn turns out to honor the services of the DVVFD led by CSZ President Michael Lumpkin, Sup. Dianne Jacob, and Steve Dillon of the DV Auxiliary. DV Capt. Troy Morrison awards Joe Ashman "Firefighter of the Year."

SEPTEMBER 2006 - The new DV fire

engine shows itself at the Swap Meet at the **McKinley's DV Lodge**. **Capt. Deede** picked it up and drove it back from Louisiana.

SEPTEMBER 2007– Deerhorn Valley Ice Cream Social complete with ice cream, old-fashioned root beer floats, fresh-popped corn and a Family Movie. Held at the **Lyons Valley Trading Post**.

This was our last community event before the Harris Fire began on October 21, 2007.
